Among the myriad objects of d'art, our Seventh Seminar was opened by an introduction Judy Cumberworth, President of Region III. Her main goal was to welcome and give a boost to the ever importance of NATRC scholarships. Further elaborated on by Patsy Tomb, NATRC President.

"Reality is change" the reality is a \$300.00 wonder and the change is your attitude towards the level of learning the horse is capable of. Give the horse every benefit of a doubt, so states Dr. Alice de Groot,

A horse in PEAK condition is in, an unstable balance of life. You are taxing the biology of the animal. Moderation is the key word! Be aware as to the stress and health of your animal and maintain a balance. Horses are not competitive, but co-operative...

Treat your horse as you would like to be treated if you had a severe stomakache. Observe all the signs and gather as much vital information as possible. Keep the horse calm and comfortable. Call the veterinarian and give him vital information such as pulse rate, respiration, capillary refilling time, color of mucous membranes, intestinal sounds, type of pain and temperature. Act quickly and avoid home remedies. Most important, try to know why this happened?

To our speakers, Alice de Groot, D.V.M. and Joe Quintana, D.V.M., a big encore, you were the nucleus of our seminar, Thanks.

You must work with your saddle until it fits your horse was the consensus of the Rider's Panel, headed by Barbara Jagoda. The use, wants, and needs of competitive trail riders were evaluated by Judd Adams, Dave Thomas, Pat McCoy, Ike Mosgrove.

The importance being put on fit, keeping the weight uniformly distributed. More pointers were: keep a loose cinch, a 'V' shaped breast collar, light weight stirrups and washable no-stretch stirrup straps. A dressage saddle balances you and keeps your legs right under you. An English saddle gives you closer contact to the horse and enables you to feel the movement of the horse. Riding gear is in a constantly changing pattern. Ike Mosgrove sure packs a "mean" canteen pouch!

To summarize the Management Panel:

1. The thought was voiced that we need a standardization of the point system that the judges use.

2. We need ways to help riders that need assistance.

3. A uniform way of marking trails.

Colic is not a disease but a symptom. The most common causes of colic are: Parasites, irregular feeding times, overfed or underfed horses, suddenchanges in the quality or types of feed. Finely chopped feeds, prime example being lawn clippings, poor dental care,and over-eating

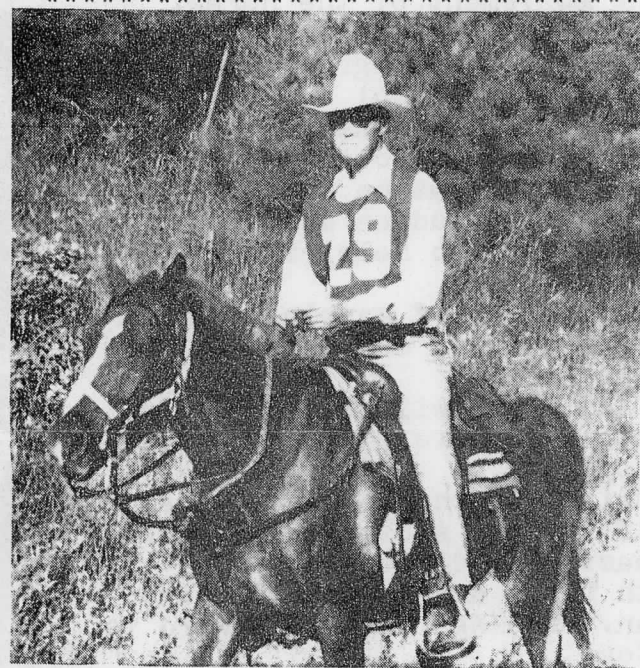

WHO RODE WHAT HORSE? The Region III Points Secretary needs to know. In order to keep track of points and mileage for year-end awards, it is imperative that the Points Secretary knows what horses belong to which members. This also goes for family members, especially where last names may differ. See MILES, MILES AND MORE MILES later in this issue for related information. NEW P&R PROCEDURE. A new system for recording P&R's will be initiated in 1983 in Region III on a trial basis. This system is being used very successfully in other Regions and was tried at the Chokecherry Canyon ride this fall. In brief, incoming P&R is taken by an advance team, written on a card which is given to the rider. The rider then moves to the waiting area to await his turn to go out. When the 10-minute time is up, the rear P&R team takes the outgoing P&R, writes it on the card which the rider then gives to the P&R captain on his way out of the stop. This procedure prevents congestions and soaring P&R's. The Regional Supply Chairman is sending a special packet to all Region III ride chairmen which will include information on the new P&R system.

ADVERTISE YOUR RIDE. The Board has approved an expenditure of \$75 for promotional material in the form of flyers and posters to advertise 1983 rides being held in Region III. A brief description of trail riding will be included to encourage new riders to attend our rides. Ride managers should continue to advertise their own rides individually in their areas.

YEAR-END AWARDS. Eligibility for year-end horsemanship awards was discussed and the following changes were put into effect for the 1983 season.

NOVICE DIV, ALL WT CLASSES--Riders must enter a minimum of two rides; no minimum points required.

OPEN DIV, JUNIOR CLASS--Riders must attend three rides; no minimum points required.

OPEN DIV, HWT & LWT CLASSES--The requirement of a minimum of 30 points with no minimum number of rides attended re-

MILEAGE FOR HORSE--Beginning in 1982, horses belonging to members but which are ridden by non-Region III or non-NATRC members will be eligible for mileage for those rides. This is a Region III practice only; National still requires that the rider be a member of NATRC in order for the horse to accumulate mileage and place points.

COLOR on the trail is very important. I definitely believe that iridescent orange and pink ribbons are the best in any situation.

In marking a trail, look back, and if you cannot see a ribbon, you've gone too far. A trail on a road should be marked every eighth of a mile--at least eight or more ribbon per mile. A turn, and especially a turn off of a road, will be marked with three ribbons and a paper plate, stating directions or having arrow.

A blue ribbon is a good third choice for novice or second day trail. Orange and pink ribbons should not be used together.

In directing riders to camp, ribbons and signs must be used on the nearest main highway and subsequently. This will be a big help to newcomers to the ride.

Some sort of consistency in ribbon color is the beginning of a good marked trail and should be considered in Region III, if not Nationally.

MILES, MILES AND M O R E MILES!!!

The miles it takes to condition and train your horse are long and many, so I know you appreciate the awards given to recognize you and your beast for the actual miles in competition.

The Region III mileage awards were begun in 1978. At that time, and until 1982, mileage was credited to the horse only if the rider was a Region III member. In 1982, horses owned by Region III members but ridden by non-Region III members will receive mileage points also.

To be eligible, horses and riders must meet the following requirements:

RIDERS--Must be members of Region III during the year for which mileage is being accumulated. Mileage will be credited retroactively to the first of the year for anyone who joins in mid-year. If membership lapses for a year, mileage for that year cannot be considered.

HORSES--Owners must meet the above criteria for rider mileage. Horses ridden by non-Region III members but owned by Region III members will be credited with those miles.
