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## "MANAGEMENT MISERIES"

*Smell The Trees  
And Flowers*



A serious problem is beginning to crop up across the nation and it affects the future of our sport perhaps more than anything yet. Ride management is getting tired. They're tired of facing the same problems and pressures year after year; they're tired of getting by on a minimum of help; and they are tired of rider complaints.

More than one region has reported having chairman who have refused to tackle the job of putting on a ride again. Whether it be from disillusionment or simply burn-out, the pendulum is certainly swinging toward fewer people willing to put up with the hassles of management.

managers and workers some relief, there won't be any rides to gather points at anyway! It will make you a more considerate and understanding rider and will start the pendulum swinging back in the other direction. With more workers to help and more riders more sympathetic to management's problems, we'll experience a greater sharing in our sport--the fun as well as the work. A SUGGESTION TO WORKERS; Ride once in awhile--borrow a horse if you need to--it puts you in the rider's boat of nerves and problems and provides a much-needed change of pace.

What happens? A small group of people is willing to put on a ride several years in a row. They put their best efforts into sponsoring "their ride" and making it better than last year's. But after awhile they run out of fresh ideas--and anyone else willing to manage the ride---so they find there's no convient place to quit. They either let the ride go or struggle through another year on fading enthusiasm. A few grumbling riders is all it takes for this management to decide it's not worth the trouble.

Then there are the regular workers who seem to make it to just about every ride in the region. They do it because they want to and they enjoy it. It dosen't take long, however, before it becomes "expected" of them (I don't need to work 'old faithful' will be there) and then comes the problem again of finding a stopping point. All too often it comes in in the form of an inconsiderate rider at a P&R stop, for instance, who causes

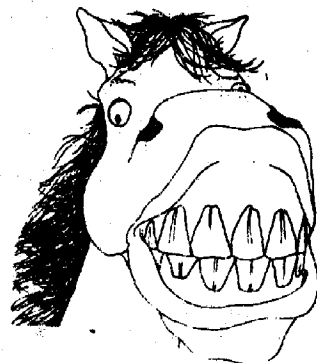

**\*\*BROWN-R-FARWA (Buddy) Wins Overall Junior Award.\*\***

I have owned Buddy for two years. We started out the 1983 ride season with five rides of experience behind him. The year was filled with fun, beauty and success. Throughout the year we saw all kinds of country, met all kinds of people and made many new friends. The year left us lots of special memories.

We began the year with miles and miles of conditioning. Most of these miles were done after dark in the cold weather because of school activities. When the warm weather and start of the ride season finally rolled around, we were ready. We went to our first ride at Navajo Lake in New Mexico. Here Buddy won one of his needed out of state firsts. The next ride was the Cavalier in Colorado Springs. He got a first place, but then had to miss our our next planned ride, The Taos Mountain, when he rolled in to the fence and cut both back legs. The legs were mending when we went to the Cottonwood canyon ride in Nebraska the latter part of June. We were the only juniors entered in the ride, but he received a sweepstakes there and got his second out of state first place. The first of July we headed for the Vedauwoo ride held at the Brown ranch in Wyoming. Buddy seemed to remember his "home" and finished in great shape with another first place. The next ride was the El Jinette Solitario near Durango where we rode the beautiful Skii country of Colorado. The next NATRC ride for us was Snowcap, two weeks later we were back in the Fort Collins area for the Van Vleet Memorial ride. We finished off the season at the Top of the World ride where Buddy got his second sweepstakes. We truly were "on top of the world" and delighted to be able to finish the season in such a nice way. Once again, school activities were beginning to conflict, so we reluctantly missed the last two rides.

The end of July we competed in the IAHA International championship ride. Buddy finished fifth in the purebred Arabian class. It was quite a different experience for us.

Buddy finished the year with seven first places out of the eight NATRC rides we competed. He won second in the Colorado Arabian Horse Association youth achievement awards. He also won his National buckle and finished first in Region III and first in the national junior also second in the high average award. Awards weren't the only thing we gained this year. We made many new friends and have lots of memories of this beautiful countryside. Through my association with judges, workers, friends fellow competitors, and my family, I have learned a lot about myself and my horse. This has truly been a rewarding and fulfilling experience for me. Tracy Naugle.

\*\*\*\*\* PAT MCCOY WINS 1st.OVERALL HORSEMANSHIP\*\*\*\*\*

This past year sure was a surprise to me! Never in my wildest dreams did I ever expect Tamaron ( a funny little gray Paso Fino) to become National Lightweight Reserve Champion, and I to become the National Lightweight rider. It definitely was not planned. I had told everyone that we were going to take it easy and were only going to five or six rides. Guess I neglected to tell Tamaron, because before I knew it five rides had gone by and he already had his National Champion and had sweepstaked two rides. It was only July, and what was I supposed to do the rest of the summer? Take up knitting? So we kept on riding. By September I realized we'd both won first place in the region in our division and I was really looking forward to the last ride I was thrilled that we had done so well, but I was plenty tired after ten rides on top of working last summer.

Then one night, late in September, Ginger Johnson called and said: "Do realize "Tom" is second in the Nation in lightweight, and somebody is right on his tail? What are you going to do about it?" Well, I figured there wasn't much I could do with only one more ride left in our region. I really had to think about this piece of bait she'd dangled in front of me. Darn! I didn't want to ride anymore. Besides, the only rides left that were half way close were in Texas or California, a thousand miles any way you looked at it. Was it worth the gamble? Would we gamble and lose? I'm not much of a gambler,



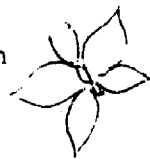
but I'm not one to quit either, so I decided to go for it. I figured it was now or never.

Through all of it, I never thought about my horsemanship as far as national racing goes, and was dumbfounded when again it was Ginger who announced at the Region II Benefit ride in California, that I had not only won first place in that ride, but had passed her and won first in the nation in lightweight division.

That ride will always have a very special place in my memory, and one I hope I don't ever forget. For the first time Tamaron's endurance was tested to the very limit. Believe me, a frightening experience if you love your horse. Tom finished the ride, but the heat and humidity took their toll, and totally exhausted him. He checked out with symptoms of thumps, which prevented him from placing. Later in the evening he became shocky and started to colic. Fortunately Dr. Goulding the vet judge was close at hand and pulled him out quickly. I had gambled everything and almost lost a dear friend. But Tom wasn't to be counted out yet, because several weeks later he went on to sweepstake the Sun Circle Thanksgiving Ride as though nothing had happened. He really proved to everyone, including me, that what Paso's may lack in size and gait, they more than make up for in heart and endurance as a competitive trail horse.

This season Tom is finally getting his well earned rest, and I am just going to play around on a few rides with my other horse. Honest injun!

\*\*\*\*\* COLORADO STALLION "ZIPTTEZ" RECEIVES LEGION OF HONOR AWARD \*\*\*\*\*

Z. FEZ; the Arabian stallion owned by Bob and Bev Romig of Crown Arabians in Mack, Colo. has received the International Arabian Horse Assc. (IAHA) Purebred Legion of Honor Award. The Romigs received the award in ceremonies held at the Mountain Region Endurance Riders Awards Banquet held in Denver November 5, 1983.

The Legion of Honor Award, the first performance level of the IAHA Achievement Awards program, was established to recognize those horses who have achieved an outstanding record in the show ring in either Halter Classes, Performance Classes, Competitive or Endurance Trail rides, or Racing. From among thousands of horses who have competed in shows, rides, and races throughout the United States and Canada, only 607 horses have qualified for this award to date.

Ziptez: is a grandson of the legendary (Witez II who was rescued along with many Polish horses in WW II by General Patton.

Ziptez: a seventeen year old stallion, has qualified for the Legion of Honor Award by earning points in open competition in twenty Competitive Trail Rides and eighteen Endurance Rides. He started competing at age thirteen.

His outstanding record in competitive trail rides includes , completion of eighteen, sixty mile rides, completion of one, fifty mile ride, and completion of one forty mile ride, with one second, one third, and seven additional Top six placings. While competing in competitive rides, he placed fourth in Region III of THE NORTH AMERICAN TRAIL RIDE CONFERENCE in 1979 - 1 second in the region in 1980. He earned his IAHA 500 Mile Award in 1980 and IAHA and NATRC 1000 mile awards in 1981.

At age fifteen, Ziptez was started in endurance riding, where he completed seventeen fifty mile rides, and one sixty mile ride, with four top ten placings. In 1982, he was the Mountain Region Champion Endurance Stallion, earned IAHA 1500 Mile Award, and earned his registration in the Endurance Horse Registry, #1009.

Ziptez, is the first stallion to earn his Legion of Honor points through a combination of two distance riding sports. He is currently working on his American Endurance Ride Conference 1000 Mile Award. During his career he has only been pulled from one ride. That was on a 100-mile endurance ride after he had spent 24 hours in a horse trailer stranded in a rainstorm while traveling to the ride, he had completed 50 miles of that ride. This is truly a fine record.

\*\*\*\*\*CATHY MORRIS AND HER FIRST TRAIL RIDING EXPERIENCE\*\*\*\*\*

Cathy read an article in the Colorado Springs newspaper about a trail ride clinic. She had grown up on a ranch, spending hours in the saddle and even though she didn't own a horse, the article intrigued her. She called and asked if she could attend the clinic as an observer. The clinic hooked her on trail riding. Now the problem-- no horse, no trailer, She knew some people however, who owned a nice six year old Arabian gelding, and they were willing to lease him to her. The only catch was that Laddie had ever done was barrel-

served the purpose. She set her sights on riding the Rocky Mountain High ride in August. She called the ride secretary and explained her nervousness about riding her first ride, and asked if there was an experienced rider who would buddy her through novice. Luckily, Susie Witter was starting a four year old and was not only willing to help Cathy out, but to get together and ride and give her pointers before the competition. Laddie started shedding his fat, got over being scared on the trail and exhibited a tremendous stride. Cathy's enthusiasm grew. She even talked her husband, Vern, into coming to Rocky Mountain High. Naturally, he got roped into doing P & Rs. Cathy and Laddie finished the ride and placed second. She decided trail riding was HER SPORT. She and Vern began to go to all the Region rides. Vern rode drag at The Top of the World. He bought an Arabian gelding so he could start competing. In the fall, both Vern and Cathy entered an endurance ride. They went 25 miles, and Cathy seeing that Laddie had the energy left, so decided to try for 50. They not only finished but they placed.

Cathy and Laddie, despite starting the season late, finished third in Novice lightweight in the Region. They were a team! Cathy knew she could never give Laddie back to his owners. So she asked them if they would sell him to her, finally, they agreed. The team will stay together.

Since its inception in 1961, NATRC has now grown to sanctioning Competitive Trail Rides in 6 Regions from Coast to Coast. Region 3 consists of New Mexico, Utah, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and Saskatchewan, Canada.

A Competitive Trail Ride is a timed event over a given distance. Most rides will offer both Novice and Open Divisions. The main distinction between the Divisions being length of trail, riding time, and age of horses. Novices travel a less difficult shortened course of about 20 miles at a slower rate. The Novice Division is specifically designed for starting young horses [age 4 and older] and new riders to Competitive Trail Riding. A 2-day OPEN Ride is between 25 and 30 miles per day that is to be ridden in 6½ to 7½ hours.

Each Division is divided into 3 Classes: Heavyweight: 190# and over [rider and tack], Lightweight: 130-189# [rider and tack] and Junior: Rider age 10-17 years. [no weight limit]

The Horses are judged by a qualified Veterinarian Judge throughout the ride for: Condition, Soundness, Way-of-going, and Manners. The Rider is judged separately by a Horsemanship Judge. Awards are presented after the completion of each ride.

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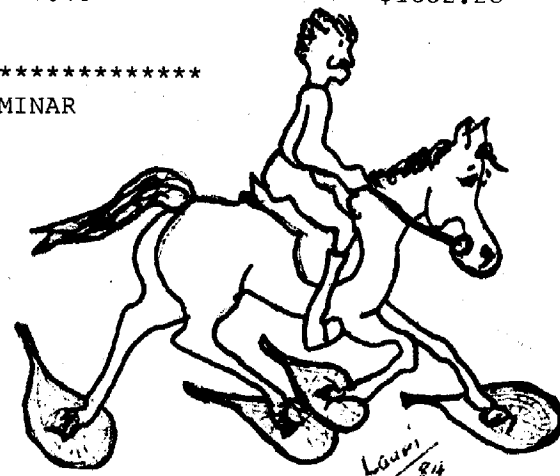

I am writing to ask for your help. As a result of decreased riders and increased costs, NATRC lost money in 1983 and begins the new ride year with a substantial deficit. In an effort to deal with this serious problem, the Board of Directors has undertaken various measures to control costs while at the same time promoting membership, the number of riders, and the overall income produced from operations. We are determined that NATRC can and must be well run on a businesslike basis if the "Hoofprints," our awards program, and other activities are all to remain and are to continue at a high level of quality.
