TURKEY TRACK II RIDE

Some drivers just unloaded horses and headed full tilt into the meadow until their wheels disappeared and that's where they camped. Latecomers had drier ground, but it was hard to get to it with all the stuck vehicles. Once we were in, the sun made a fantastic comeback and the whole weekend in camp was great.

It was not and humid, but the Shannons always had ice cold sun tea available in camp and fabulous meals too. There was plenty of water available on the trails for horses and riders thanks to Ken, Dennis, Cappy and the P/R teams. Sunday, while out hiding the judges for a judged trot, we actually heard a wild turkey! He took off to parts unknown though and all the riders saw were spooked up cows, which I'm quite sure Dr. Freidly enjoyed as he watched the horses' reactions. Sunday was a rushed day for the judges as the riders were really spread out. Our problem of ribbon pulling was eased somewhat this year, and the lead riders dis an excellent job rechanging the few that were gone. After timing back in Sunday, riders were offered watermelon and a pick off the ribbon tree. 

Friday's check-in procedures were ablely handled by Barb Butterfield and several other volunteers in the secretary's absence (pressures of the job). The afternoon was marred by a distressing accident. Jo and Milne Parish who lost their motor home in a fire returning home from this ride two years ago, were on their way to the ride this year when their mare Pokee went through the floorboards of their trailer, broke her leg and had to be humanely destroyed. All members who haul horses in trailers should periodically check the condition of the flooring of the trailer.

We had 58 riders compete with 21 Open riders, 34 novices (including a fine showing of Juniors). In spite of the weather, they all enjoyed the well-marked trails. Even the P/R teams got some thrills...on one occasion they spotted a whole herd of elks! Judges for the ride were Dr. Jim Freidly and Judi Tobias.

Very special breed and sweepstake awards were pewter horses mounted on geodes. And the the Awards dinner was deliciously prepared by the 4-H cooks (prime rib and creampuffs!).

THE 15th ANNUAL VAN VLEET MEMORIAL COMPETITIVE TRAIL RIDE

The 15th Annual Van Vleet Memorial Competitive Trail Ride on September 27th & 28th, was a success by almost all measures. Golden Gate Canyon is a very scenic location, with substantial variety of terrain well-suited for a competitive trail ride.. ..based on comments from riders. Of particular enjoyment was a 2-mile stretch of the Mountain Lion Trail which wound its way up a narrow canyon crossing fern-lined stream ten times in a half-hour, emerging upon a series of beaver ponds, and then climbing almost to the top of Windy Peaks. A turn-out of 44 riders (from 51 registrants) was quite a respectable showing for a new ride location and

this late in the season. Although weather forecasts threatened snow, it held off until Monday when all the riders had departed (it dumped two inches on Monday while we took down the tent and cleaned up campi). Temperatures were in the 60's and 70's Saturday and Sunday, which made it a pleasant ride for horses and riders alike...and, the aspen trees were in their full splendor. Because of Park regulations, ribbons were restricted to marking turns and trail crossings.

Even with a detailed map this provided quite a challenge to most riders, with some added extra miles to their ride as a result. In spite of this, all riders finished on time on Saturday. Sunday was a different story, with all riders having to make up time at the end of the day, including a mad dash the last two miles for two Open riders (names unmentioned). The lay out of the Park proved quite convenient for ride management to get to P&R and judging spots out of the rain proved quite convenient for the management volunteers who showed up with time to spare. There was an abundance of help, mostly volunteers who showed up unannounced, but nevertheless, greatly appreciated. The horse and horsemanship judging teams (Lou & Nancy Pavetti, Dr., David Varra, Patsy Tomb and Bonnie Trafford) were very effective and efficient...so much so that the Awards on Sunday evening concluded by 7 p.m. Carol McCoy and Carl & Patti MyCoff won the raffle of two half-Arabian fillies, donated at the last minute by Jim Peek...with the proceeds of \$205 being donated to the Region III scholarship fund in Violet Peek's name. Rider vest fee donations totaling \$88 were donated to the scholarship fund in Sue Bretag's name. Thanks to all of you with a generous spirit!

Based upon the positive feedback received at the ride, and several letters since then, we will be putting on the ride in the Park again next year with several changes. First, we will correct the times to balance out Saturday and Sunday. Second, we will make special efforts to obtain a pre-rider who knows the trails to make sure the trail turns are wellmarked & ribbons are not removed (any volunteers?) and third, we are thinking of moving up the ride two weeks (the week after the Top of the World Ride) to reduce the chance of snow. Goodbye to our friends... SUE BRETAG

Susan G. Bretag succumbed to cancer on Saturday, September 21, 1986 in Colorado Springs, Colorado. She was 42 years old. Ms. Bretag was not your ordinary person...that is why there is now a riding trail bearing her name in the Garden of the Gods. For 15 years, Ms. Bretag, a paralegal for the 4th District Attorney office, slugged it out with cancer. She got in a lot of punches...18 times she underwent surgery for abdominal cancer; 17 times she bounced back. "Somebody asked her once how she kept going and she said it was anger," recalled district attorney investigator Ed Rodgers, "She refused to let it defeat her." Even in her final days, said friend, Jeanie Brooks, "Sue was constantly giving us an example that there is no limit to our strength and courage." Ms. Brooks continued, "She had such a love of nature and people, and she could project such feeling for the beauties in both that we could see and appreciate things we had not been able to see and appreciate before." And her friends said Sue continued to laugh and joke even as she lay dying in the hospital. Outside of work, Sue was very involved in her horses and horse-related activities. She rode every day until five weeks before her death. She not only rode for pleasure but she engaged in years of competitive trail rides, judged competitions, photographed horses and wrote about them for horse magazines. She also fought many battles to establish new riding trails and keep existing ones. Over 100 people gathered at the Susan G. Bretag trail for the ceremony on Aug. 5th...including many city officials and policemen. She was a former president of EPCHC and on the board of NATRC/Region III. In 1975 she was named Legal Secretary of the Year by the El Paso County Trial Lawyers Association. Any contributions in her name may be sent to: The Palmer Foundation, P.O. Box 1281, Colorado Springs, CO 80901. Her friend, Judi Tobias, wrote the following poem for Sue: "FOR SUE....I think of you, free of pain, free of the poor, tired body that betrayed you so. I think of you astride a wondrous horse...that carries you endlessly through flowered paths beneath a sky forever blue. I think of you...of your great brave soul set free...for I know you are, in Paradise." (excepts from the Gazette & Judi Tobias' article in EPCHC News.)

ED GOTHBERG

Edwin K. Gothberg died on Friday, September 26, 1986 at his home on Casper, Wyoming at the age of 65. Mr. Gothberg was born on July 2, 1921 in Casper and moved to San Francisco at the age of 8. When he was 18 years old, he returned to Casper to ride his horse Trigger II and was devoted to the training and raising of horses. He graduated from California College of Arts & Crafts and received a Master's degree from UC-Berkeley. Mr. Gothberg, who was a well-known Casper artist, had taught at Casper College from 1955 to 1980. He is survived by his wife, Angela, and his five daughters.

Ed's accomplishments with NATRC/Region III were as follows: in 1983, Ed's Half-Arabian gelding, Kermit+, was first-place National Heavyweight Champion, a National Champion and received the 1000-mile award. He also rode his Arabian stallion, Tarlima, in many NATRC

RIDE MANAGEMENT NEEDS MORE HELPERS

Region III may be losing rides next year because of a lack of volunteer help and increasing costs of putting on a trail ride. Helpers are primarily needed the day of the ride.

The money that ride management collects from us, the riders, generally covers only a portion of the total cost of a ride; usually for judges' expenses, trail ribbon, permits, and awards - directly out of pocket costs. Ride management time, and expenses such as gasoline fall into the donation category. Therefore, most helpers have been non-riders; spouses of riders, sponsoring club members, family and friends of the ride management or anyone who did not know how to say "no".

Therefore, Region III would like to call upon it's riders to make a committment for 1987: make a committment to be a helper on a ride weekend for at least one ride. Be a P&R person, or help with the meals, or whatever ride management needs most. The benefits to you and ride management will far outweigh having to give up one ride.

Pick a ride for next year and contact ride management NOW by telephone, letter, or better yet at the Annual Seminar on November 8th, 1986. You will be glad you did!

REMINDER: It is the responsibility of the rider to verify points and mileage with the appropriate Point Secretary prior to October 15th of each year. Otherwise, you must accept the points and mileage as calculated by the Point Secretaries.

Railroad Corridors Are Special

Railroad rights of way are different.
These long and narrow corridors are perfect for linear uses such as running, horseback riding, cross-country skiing and bicycling. And they provide a lot of recreation on very little land — a mere 200 acres of right of way can provide a park over 20 miles long!

Moreover, railroad corridors are continuous tracts in highly fragmented urban and suburban areas. Assembling hundreds of small parcels into a new city park for recreation and commuting could be politically difficult and financially prohibitive. In contrast, an abandoned track can offer this opportunity at lower cost — and perhaps even for free.

Finally, railroad rights of way provide excellent wildlife habitat, serve as shelterbelts to reduce soil erosion and, in the Midwest, contain some of the last remnants of the original prairie

After the Trains Stop Running

he Conservancy does not advocate the curtailment of any railroad service or the abandonment of any trackage. However, when railroads do abandon rights of way that were obtained specifically for transportation purposes, the Conservancy works to keep those lands in public use as trails.

Congress supports this effort. Under federal law, the Interstate Commerce Commission, the U.S. Department of Transportation and the U.S. Department of the Interior must all encourage the conversion of unused rail lines to trails. Many states and counties have become actively involved in railto-trail projects. And scores of private groups have mobilized to save their local corridors from being

Unfortunately, however, the rail abandon-ment process is complex, with many pitfalls, short deadlines and limited opportunity for trails groups and agencies to become involved. Many corridors are lost before people even know of their availability. That's why the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy was formed.

What the Conservancy Does

he Rails-to-Trails Conservancy (RTC) is a non-profit organization created in 1985 by trails enthusiasts. RTC's program includes public education, advocacy, negotiation and short-term land purchase to preserve rail corridors for future generations of trail users. The Conservancy rarely becomes involved in specific conversion projects on its own; instead, it notifies local groups of upcoming abandonments, assists public and private agencies in following proper legal procedures, and publicizes rails-to-trails issues throughout the country. In the nation's capital RTC works for simplified regulations to promote rail conversions.

DO YOU KNOW YOUR FELLOW COMPETITION?

Our rider has been a horse addict since she was big enough to point at a horse and yell, according to her Mother, a city girl. Her Dad was born on a ranch in Steamboat Springs, Colorado that his parents had homesteaded. He loved the mountains, horses and skiing.

Our rider was born in the foothills, north of San Bernardino. She was 8 years old, when her Dod bronkt ber, her first horse, although he had been taking her riding since she was three. She has had bornes ever since. As a young girl she preferred to run her horse around the mountain instead of the usual parameter of most girls. It was nice then, with lots of wildlife. Her dream was to run away to Wyomung and murry a cowboy and raise horses, instead she met and married a "city bred" Californian, after a 30 day courtsiup. She was working for the State of California as a psychiatric technician, and he was training there too. They have lots of fun telling people they met in the State Mental Hospital. For some reason their two daughters, don't see much changing later to medicine.

Two girls were born while living in California. The family moved to Colorado in 1970, and in 1980 they moved to Southern New Mexico, buying a small ranch in Dexter where they raise Arabian horses. She believes that Arabians should not only be beautiful but be able to do mentally and physically what ever you want them to do. One of their Arabians, FIVE WINES SANT, is close to finishing his LEGICN OF MERIT, with points in Class A Halter, Performance, Endurance and Competitive Trail Riding. She loves to show halter horses and then take them out on the trail when they are old enough.

About five years ago, she was badly injured in a accident, resulting in a broken jaw and neck, internal injuries and other fractures, and was partially paralyzed for a short time. She was told she would probably never be able to ride or compete again. Fourteen months later it was discovered she had cancer that had started to spread, and was told she had about a year to live. Chemo-therapy to attempt to slow the spread of the discasse was advocated. Our rider, with her usual spink told them to "go to hell, that there had to be a better way." and started Immune-therapy treatment with the Livingston Clinic. This is treatment to strengthen the immune-system with matrition, vitamins, vaccines and other treatments including visualization and the relief of stress to help the body fight the disease. She never had conventional treatment. In three months she went into remission and remained in excellent health ever since. Because of this program she was able to resume a normal life and ride her horses as she wishes. Her family is on the same diet and vitamin program, and as a result they also are remaining healthy and never ill.

The daughters, Jane and Deidra and husband Dwight are not all that enthused about those 4 legged creatures that "eat the barn" and tear up fences, although he does admit they have a good use(regarding specific contributions to the garden soil" and he does condescend to ride once in a while. Their oldest daughter Jane, is married and will be making our rider a Grandmother come March. Deidra is a junior in Highschool, enjoys "PGR ing" on NMORC RIDES. She competed in a 1985 ride.

Our Rider and husband love to travel, and she almost has him talked into taking the horses on their next trip. They have just bought an antique buggy(restored and beautiful) and have a galding that drives beautifully. So now, she has a new way to use the horses, while Dwight must figure a way to haul buggy and horse together.

Currently husband Dwight manages the ALLWCOOS HOME CENTER, and she is office manager for Peccs Valley Anasthesia Association, both in Roswell, New Mexico

She concludes with, "Thank God for my patient, understanding and loving husband."
