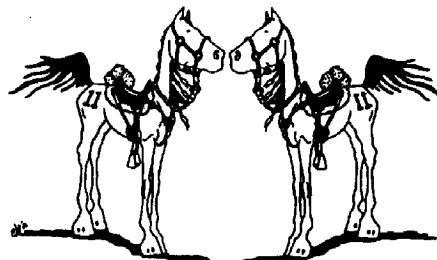

A Letter from your new Prez...

As the 1989 Region III President, I would like to thank all the Board Members and Ride Managements for a really full and fun year in 1988. This is going to be a hard act to follow. I would also like to thank all the current membership for their participation.

Well, what a shock I had at the convention! First, I was asked to run for the Board of Directors, next thing I know, I'm the President. It was pretty scary at first thought, but now so many folks have stepped up and said they would help ... I'm getting very enthusiastic!

It's clear that lots of folks love NATRC, and that's good because we now have a challenge before us.

I may be a bit of a pessimist, however, I believe we are beginning to have a problem in

Region III. We are not filling Rides, and this makes it difficult or impossible for the individual Ride to break even. (Some of the Ride sponsors would even like to make some money for all their effort.) The average Ride has 46 riders. This is 14 short of full and amounts to some \$700+ of income the Rides are missing. Thus, they can't afford to hire out-of-state judges or feed their workers, etc., and they are lucky if they break even.

Apparently we do not have a large enough membership to support the number of Rides we have. This brings us to the choice of dropping Rides, or increasing the rider population. I, for one, love all our Rides and would like to add a few more. Therefore, how can we add and retain riders? This is where we need the membership's help.

I propose a real push this year to have lots of clinics all over the region. Also, some kind of a "Welcome New Rider Program" to help us retain the riders we scare up. Other additional ideas are certainly welcome. As the next couple of months progress, we will be implementing this membership push. If you have any ideas, or want to volunteer for something, please let me know.

LISHAM is my 11 year old purebred Arabian gelding out of a Van Vleet mare. He is 15 hands tall, chestnut with flaxen main and tail, and weighs about 850 pounds. We rode for six years together on mountain trails and the Pawnee Grasslands -- he is an expert with bogs, rocks, downed timber and water crossings. He has a wonderful extended trot, very comfortable lope, and is the most sure-footed horse I've ever ridden.

Now I want to sell him, because I've gone to a larger horse more suitable for my height and weight. My new horse, Copper, was too afraid to put him safely into TEAM training, which I wanted to learn, so I took Lisham as my model horse. He completed TEAM training in 1987, and his ground handling is now even more impeccable. He is a sweet horse, but has an occasional streak of willfulness, which I'm working out with him.

LISHAM is available to a light to middle weight experienced competitive trail rider. I'm asking \$2250 or best offer. Come see and ride him. He is available for two-week trial, with 50% down. If you're out of the area -- come for a visit and I'll split cost of the first day lodging, and will split cost to deliver him to you anywhere in Region III after full prepayment.

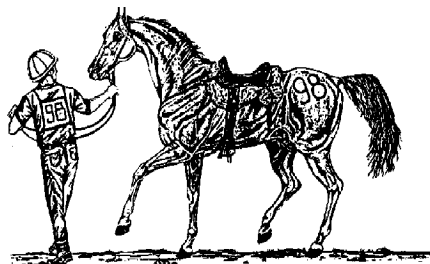

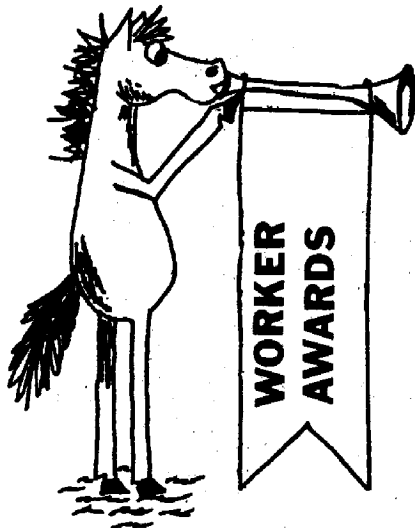

WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT "WORKER AWARDS"?

Worker points are cumulative from year to year. It is the responsibility of each Ride Management to send these points to the Awards Chairman, Pat Jubb (3455 Hart sock Lane, Colorado Springs, CO 80907 or call 303-574-8522). Worker need not be members of Region III or National NATRC to be eligible for Year-End Awards. Management should list the workers, legibly printed or typed, using full names. If a position is shared by two or more persons, the points will be divided among them. Persons serving several positions will receive points for each position.

RIDE CHAIRMAN/250 points, RIDE SECRETARY/250 points, P&R CHAIRMAN/100 points, TRAIL MASTER/100 points, RIDE STEWARD/75 points, JUDGES SECRETARY/150 points, STABLE STEWARD/75 points, STEWARD HELPERS/25 points, DRIVER OF OWN VEHICLE ON RIDE/75 points, COOK/100 points, PRE-RIDERS & SAFETY RIDERS/25 points per day, TIMERS/25 points, WEIGHMASTER/25 points, TRAIL MARKERS, must have a minimum of 2 days/50 points (maximum), P&R PERSONNEL/25 points, AWARDS CHAIRMAN/25 points.

This is all subject to review and changes by the current Board of Directors for Region III. Revised in 1985, and in January of 1986, and again in January of 1988.

SPRING CLINICS!

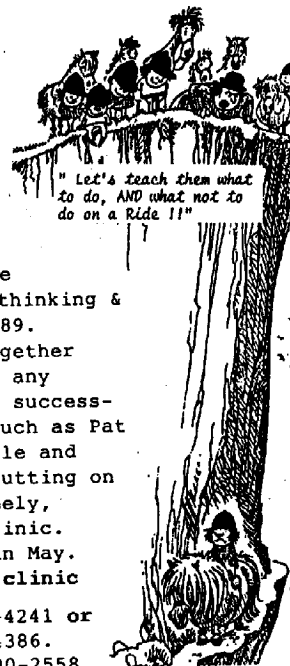

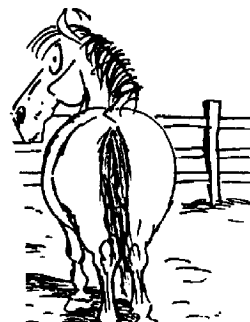

COLORADO HORSE RESCUE

Over the years, CHR has placed hundreds of horses, working with an increasing number each year. In 1988, over 50 horses have been sheltered or assisted in some way. CHR offers varied, flexible and innovative services:

- (1) We attempt to problem solve for horses and owners. We accept and resolve cases on an individual basis giving "emergency" situations first priority.
- (2) We place still useful horses in responsible homes by:
 - Accepting as tax-deductible donations, horses; some who would otherwise be sent to slaughter, or some horses who would be difficult to place in the homes they deserve because of age, injury or other problems.
 - Brokering the sale of some horses for a small donation.
 - Assisting horse owners in a variety of ways to protect horses.
- (3) We work to save horses from abuse by:
 - Arranging donations of abused, neglected, starved horses so that CHR can find them safe homes;
 - Moving horses out of crisis situations on short notice;
 - Working with humane societies, horse groups, animal control officers, Brand Inspectors, etc., to report and resolve abuse.



COLORADO HORSE RESCUE is a volunteer, non-profit and donation-funded program, which finds new homes and lives for horses, (1) those that are unwanted, (2) those that are neglected, abused, and / or abandoned, (3) those horses who are in danger of being sent to slaughter.

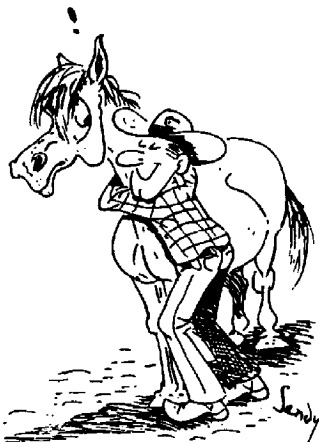

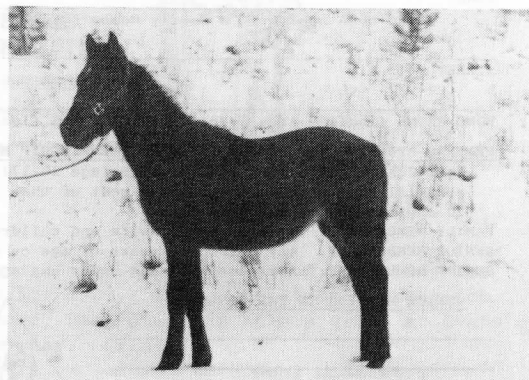

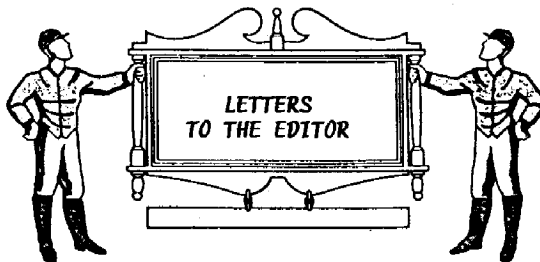

Letter to the Editor:

TOPIC: 1989 Membership Drive - Promotion to Increase Rider Participation

Recently I received a report on all 1988 Rides from Ride Sanction Chairwoman, Ike Mosgrove. Analyzing that material, it became obvious to me that we had best review our position relative to the other Regions and reconsider our promotional position, objectives, and marketing targets, as they relate to our healthy growth.

At about the same time, Tom Butterfield called me to question "whether we have too many Rides in Region III". He pointed out that some Rides, including Top of the World, are just breaking even while other Rides are losing riders and therefore, money. Should this continue, sponsoring organizations will become disenchanted and withdraw their support.

This could develop into a serious situation, so let's first examine our recent Ride History to evaluate our current position.

(*Similar statistics appear elsewhere in this Newsletter, under Membership Report.)

Note where Region III stands relative to the other Regions. The average number of Rides for all Regions in 1988 is 12. The average number of Rides in 1989 will be 13. In 1988, the average number of riders for all Regions was 50. Region III averaged almost 47 riders in 1988.

Region III has historically been a leader in NATRC. While the number of Rides in our Region is satisfactory, the number of rider participants needs to show improvement in 1989.

Increasing the average participation per Ride by only 13 riders in 1989 would put our average at 60 riders. NATRC, Ride Management and the riders would all be happy.

Let's all give some thought (and than action!) to the most effective way we can add an average of 13 riders to the Region III Rides in 1989. Here are some of my observations and suggestions:

1. Our most successful Rides do much to promote their local riders. It is their Novice Class that makes the real difference between success or failure.

(a) Ride Management should develop a definite promotional plan with specific objectives.

(b) Each Ride should have one or more promotional people talling up the Ride and giving presentations to local horse clubs, etc.

2. Simple Clinics can be developed that are very effective. Linda and Judd Adams have a format you might want to use.

3. We now have put our "Introduction to Competitive Trail Riding" and "NATRC, PM Magazine" on video for ease of presentation. Each is 16 minutes long and you can use either one or both for promotional presentations.

(a) Showing the tape, answering the questions that will arise, and giving out our Ride Schedules and promotional materials is all that is necessary.

4. Experienced riders should commit themselves to try to bring at least one new person per Ride season into Competitive Trail Riding.

(a) Let's target our best prospects. From long experience, I'm convinced we should be promoting the mature adults about 35 years or older.

(b) It is the established adults we seek. If they are horse people, they will usually welcome a different and more satisfying horse experience. Mature adults are most likely to have the time and the money to participate.

5. And...don't overlook the appeal of our new Competitive Pleasure Class.

6. Region III should have an active program for the promotion of new riders. Whatever positive action is developed it should be carefully planned on an annual basis and supervised.

(a) Perhaps our effort could be outlined for emphasis at different attack points by several people, i.e. media representatives, horse club representatives, promotion at Competitive Rides and at Endurance Rides, etc.

7. And once again....the very best promotion is you talking to another horseperson.

8. Add your ideas to this important project. Let your Region III Board know about your ideas for promoting our sport.

9. At our Region III Board meeting on January 14, 1989, this article was discussed and a positive promotional idea emerged. That idea is to consider giving a financial incentive to a rider who brings a new rider to a Competitive Ride this season. I think this is a very positive program and I would like to see it used at least in 1989 by all Region III Rides.

(a) The Ride does not lose money by following this program. The Ride gains by receiving a lesser amount on a rider that would not have been there otherwise, and NATRC might gain a new member. (Think the glass is half full, not half empty.)



I'm convinced we have the very best horse product. Our job is to let new riders know about it and to let them experience it. You can see how easy it will be to increase our average Ride by 13 riders in 1989.

Ride Managements, hold the line in '89! Our best year is yet to come. With everyone's support we can easily meet our goal this year.

BACK TO THE BASICS

"This Ride season, try to invite one new friend...even if you have to give them a ride there!"

I attend the NATRC National Board of Directors meeting in Phoenix in November. Talking with the Directors from each of the six Regions, I became aware of some concerns that may affect us all and need to be addressed. These

concerns are interrelated for they involve all three phases of our sport...riders, management and judges. I am writing this article for I feel all of us need to take a good look at where we are and where we're headed.

I have been involved with NATRC since 1971. Over the years we have improved our sport with more and better knowledge of available criteria, better scorecards, and better and more explicit rules. There is no doubt about it, the horses and riders have gotten better and better. However, a trend has been developing in the 80's which I feel is detrimental to our sport.

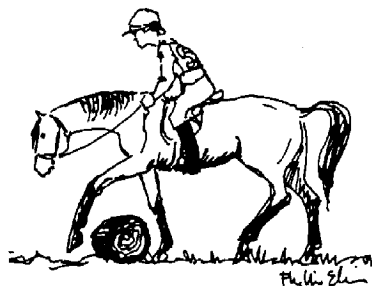
In some Regions, the veterinarians never get out on the trails to observe obstacles, but only stay at the P&Rs. These judges are really not using all of the criteria to evaluate and separate horses. On the other hand, many veterinarian judges are telling us that they are unable to separate horses and seem to be separating horses mostly in the manners categories and sometimes with over-contrived obstacles. In this way they are unbalancing the correctly weighted categories for they are not putting the emphasis where it should be ...on soundness and condition. A veterinarian judging video has just become available. This video along with the newly revised veterinarian section in the judges manual for 1989 should help standardize the judging and put the correct emphasis where the scoring procedure has always been intended, on soundness and condition.

Management becomes involved because often the judges request management to speed up the Ride on the second day in order to put more stress on the horses. Some Rides are now so fast that they are of little pleasure and no fun because the rider is pushing constantly to make time wherever possible. Because management tries to get the riders out on the trail earlier, the veterinarian judges are modifying and in some cases even ignoring the Sunday a.m. trailer check. Many of the new judges in the 80's are unaware of the correct procedure for the Sunday trailer check as they apprenticed under judges who were taking short cuts. That Sunday trailer check is all important. They will find heat, excessive filling, stiffness or sore backs that they did not find the previous p.m. The very veterinarian judges that say they can't separate the horses and need more stress (faster pace) are the judges who do not do a complete trailer check and they are missing out on important criteria.

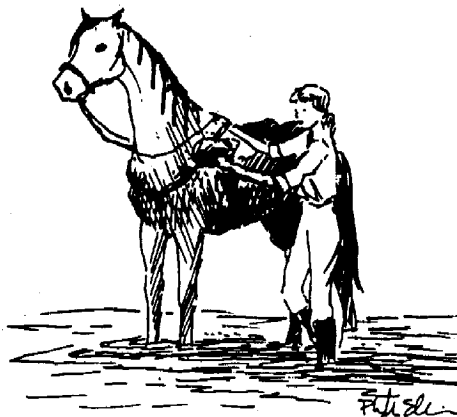
How can we reverse this trend? I maintain that we must get back to the basics that were established long ago. This is where the riders become involved. The riders are bringing some of these problems on themselves. The critiques show us very positively that the riders want to get home as early as possible after completion of the Ride. I as a rider, invest money, time and energy in a weekend. I want the emphasis placed on soundness and condition, not on obstacles, manners and speed though they too have their place. I feel the riders owe it to themselves to give the judges the time needed to do a thorough job. The emphasis has moved away from what was originally intended....scoring being 40 for soundness and 40 for condition.

Management has it's job. They know their trail and one of their jobs is to provide the best timing of the trail that they possibly can. It must not be excessively fast but should not be too slow. The Rides must be fast enough to really stress the horses or the judge will have to resort to less important criteria to separate the horses. When a judge asks management to speed up the Ride, management should say "no". After all, they have timed it to the best of their ability. Management must stick by their timing...with judges and with late riders. Also, the management should not pressure the judges to get the riders out on the trail earlier in lieu of a good Sunday a.m. trailer check.

Another problem we have is that the riders just don't understand the work involved with finalizing the score cards. The riders' work is finished when they complete their final vet check. A veterinarian must spend a minimum of 4 minutes per horse at check-out. That's 240 minutes or approximately 4 hours for 60 horses. If the rider is one of the early ones checked out, the time seems awfully long until awards are announced. Judging a Ride is real work, and a gruelling job. The judging fee doesn't begin to compensate for the veterinarian's time, work and professional knowledge and opinions in evaluating horses. Let's take a look at what we are asking of our veterinarian judges. Here is just one portion as an example. Say we have 60 horses. Each horse usually has 4 legs. That makes 240 legs for a one time check of horses. Multiply that by four: check in, Saturday p.m. check, Sunday a.m. check and check-out. That means the Vet has bent over to examine legs or pick up feet 960 times over the weekend! And I think I have a problem just cleaning out my horse's feet!!

Believe me, the judges are aware of the pressure the riders impose on them to rush and finalize the scorecards. Some judges are better at this than others, but it comes with organization and practice. In all fairness, we, the riders, must give the judges the opportunity to take the time necessary to complete their jobs well. These veterinarians are working to help us and our horses because they care about these animals and want to help the riders become more knowledgeable.

We all feel this sport of ours is very special and worthwhile. With understanding and consideration of each of the three sections of NATRC, riders, judges and management, we can go a long way in bringing the emphasis back where it belongs...on soundness and condition. Now that we have taken a look at some of the causes, let's get back to the basics.

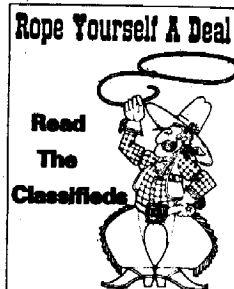

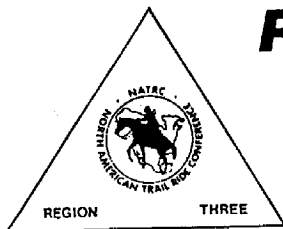
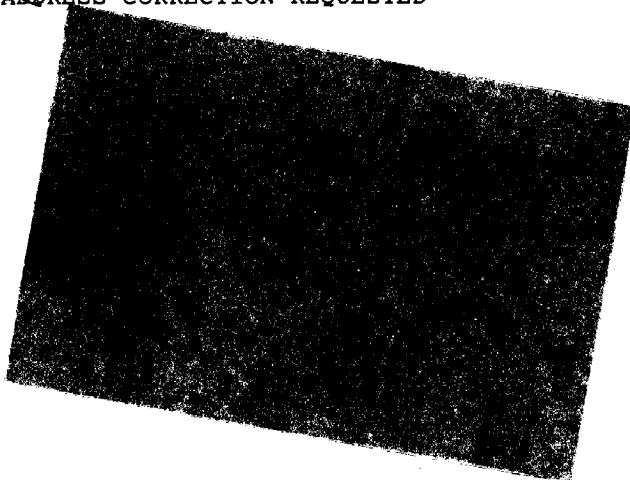
